Howard Brown Health Center exists to eliminate the disparities in health care experienced by lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people through research, education, and the provision of services that promote health and wellness.

Before the AIDS crisis and “LGBTQ”, before civil unions, marriage equality, and the Affordable Care Act, there was Howard Brown Health Center.

Founded in 1974 as one of the nation’s first gay-focused health centers, Howard Brown Health Center (HBHC) created a safe and welcoming health care environment primarily for gay men. As the AIDS epidemic unfolded, HBHC took the lead and became the primary source of HIV information and treatment in the Chicago metropolitan area. As treatment of HIV evolved into a disease management model, HBHC continued to evolve and grow.

HBHC remains a source of information, education, safety, treatment, and care for over 13,000 people in the last year alone. In the last two years, HBHC has added routine opt-out HIV testing, and expanded women’s health services. In the year ahead, we will be improving chronic disease outcomes in our patients.

The Affordable Care Act will allow new patients to make HBHC their health home, and the

organization is prepared to grow and expand to meet the increasing need for culturally competent and compassionate primary care. While the expansion of health care is historic, there will always be those who are uninsured and underinsured, and HBHC will be - as it has been for almost 40 years - their health home.

From its beginnings as a source of health care for a marginalized population, Howard Brown Health Center continues to evolve into a patient-centric medical home. Our mission continues to provide high quality health care, regardless of one’s ability to pay.

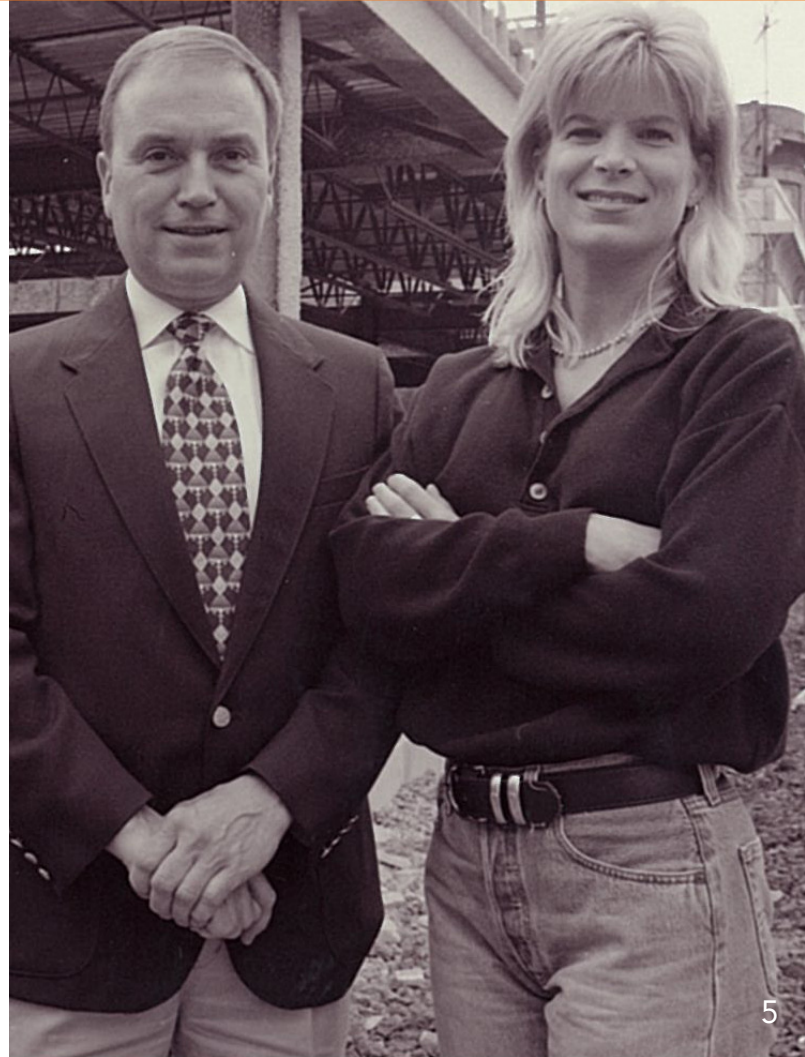

Madeline Jaderberg

Patient

Madeline Jaderberg was more than uncomfortable living as a male. Daily life was becoming increasingly difficult, "Like life or death," she says, and something had to be done. Making the decision to begin Hormone Replacement Therapy (HRT) at Howard Brown Health Center was the culmination of an intense search for identity that included attempts at self-medication. "For almost two years, I purchased over the counter medicines that didn't do anything," she says.

Madeline was able to begin HRT in a welcoming environment with a staff that was fully informed, knowledgeable, and equipped to handle every stage of her transition - even in ways she didn't expect, like navigating practical, legal issues.

"I didn't expect - I had hoped, but I didn't expect - the openness. People here are on the level, they're cool. They know what's up. Transitioning is as much a mental as a physical adjustment, and in ways that you don't expect. They've just made it so much easier, even with minor things, like helping me with my name change. They go the extra mile."

Madeline's experience at HBHC has been crucial to her developing sense of self acceptance. "I'm still paranoid about judgment, sometimes, but I feel normal here, and people here help me combat the idea that if something's not considered normal, it's weird. But normal is just a statistic. To feel accepted is just amazing. It's taken a long time for me to feel this way, but Howard Brown Health Center certainly helped with that from the start. I feel normal here because I am normal."

I caught a glimpse of myself in a mirror once. Just once, I caught a glimpse of me.

I wasn't concentrating on the mirror to see what was or wasn't there. It was just, for a couple of seconds, I actually saw myself.

More than a year ago, I became Interim President and CEO of Howard Brown Health Center. My predecessor saw us through a challenging time, and my role was to further stabilize the organization and prepare a foundation for a new, permanent leader.

In October 2012, we launched a strategic planning process, the first in more than five years. We prioritized what we needed to accomplish in a rapidly changing health care environment, including identifying and implementing structural changes and additional partnerships as we prepared for the Affordable Care Act (ACA). We evaluated processes across the organization and identified several areas for operational improvement and enhancement. In collaboration with the Board of Directors and key stakeholders, we also determined the attributes, qualifications, and experience that our new leader should possess, and a search is currently underway.

Financially, we continue to make remarkable progress.

With only five audit findings and with no new findings in the last two years, our financial house

is in order. And throughout, we continued to improve access to primary care and support services.

Our formal strategic planning process is completed, and we have begun the implementation phase that allows us to build on improved internal processes and procedures. We recently partnered with the Lean Six Sigma project team from GE to improve productivity, efficiency, patient flow, experience and, most importantly, satisfaction.

While more people will have access to health care through the ACA, financial support from individuals and corporations will remain crucial to HBHC. We need to ensure that everyone has access to health care, including people who will still be unable to access it through the ACA. With a strategically focused, sound plan in place, that support will be more than a source of funding; it will be a genuine investment in the future of health care in our region.

Howard Brown Health Center is an organization that has undergone substantive transformation and is structurally, culturally, and financially stronger than ever.

While many still think of Howard Brown Health Center as a HIV and STI clinic, we are, in fact, a full-service community health center. Our mix of services create a true health home for patients and clients who come for primary care, prescriptions, alternative inseminations and women’s services, behavioral health, pediatric, and geriatric practices. Moreover, we go beyond traditional health care by providing our youth with day-to-day basic needs such as food, clothing, transportation and laundry, as well as a space that is both emotionally and physically safe.

Throughout 2013, we’ve focused on preparing our organization for an influx of new patients seeking health care under the Affordable Care Act. There will, however, remain people who are uninsured and underinsured, and we will continue to be here for them. Our mission remains to provide health care regardless of one’s ability to pay, and those who donate to Howard Brown Health Center should understand that we still have a real need for their support.

The Board is excited about the year ahead. Karma Israelsen, our interim President and CEO, is handing our next executive a strong, robust organization that our new leader can take to the next level upon taking the helm in early 2014. The sky is the limit in terms of what we can do as we continue to grow both as Chicago’s hub of LGBTQ-competent care and a magnet for all people throughout the region who are looking for excellence in their chosen health home.

Danica Wilson, M.D.
Physician

Patients who don't even identify as LGBTQ tell me that they appreciate a facility and environment that is accepting, and non-judgmental. As a physician I think that's important, and for the community to know that we provide a wide range of services for all kinds of people, no matter how they identify. That's what I want people to know.

Doctor Danica Wilson accepted her position at Howard Brown Health Center because of its proximity to her hometown and her experience with transgender patients and HIV/AIDS. But she also appreciates the unexpected range of services offered by HBHC and the people it serves. "What we provide here would surprise people," she says. "Women's health, including alternative insemination and coloscopies, treatment of chronic health problems, like high blood pressure and diabetes. People hear 'health center' but they don't comprehend all the things we do here."

While Doctor Wilson considers many LGBTQ health issues and concerns to the population as a whole, there are some exceptions. Exceptions such as depression, "that stems from growing up without understanding, debating within themselves, and trying to figure out where they fit into society." She appreciates the welcoming and accepting environment that HBHC offers people, whatever their health concerns or however they identify, which makes them more likely to seek treatment. "People need to feel comfortable when they see a doctor," she says. "Otherwise they don't address their health issue until it's much more serious than it needed to be."

She takes pleasure in educating patients about the other resources that are available to them through Howard Brown Health Center. Says Doctor Wilson, "I've had a lot of patients come in fearful of not being able to pay for services or get medicine. I tell them that should be the least of their concerns. 'Seriously?' they ask, and I reassure them that money is the least of their concerns at Howard Brown Health Center."

The Programs at HBHC

PRIMARY MEDICAL SERVICES

For all patients, HBHC utilizes a multidisciplinary structure for our primary care team, which consists of physicians, nurse practitioners, physician assistants, nurses, medical assistants, behavioral health consultants, therapists, and case managers. Together, they provide a seamless continuum of care and provide effective chronic disease management. This comprehensive primary medical care is offered alongside linkages to behavioral health care, case management and additional social services. HBHC offers culturally competent specialty care in the areas of infectious disease, gynecology, psychiatry, and gerontology. Other specialties are available through referral to a culturally competent provider.

Women's Services

HBHC promotes the health and wellness of the lesbian, bisexual, queer, and transgender community through health care services, public education, research, and programming. Our women's services include alternative insemination, breast and cervical cancer screening, STD and HIV testing, social and support groups, and outreach and education.

Alternative Insemination (AI)

HBHC offers an alternative insemination (AI) program for the lesbian, bisexual, transgender, and queer community. Our AI program provides holistic, affirming care to individuals, couples, and families as they prepare for pregnancy and begin the conception process. HBHC strongly believes in comprehensive approaches to health and wellness, and our AI program reflects this by offering medical care, behavioral health, research, referrals, and social support services to program participants.



Pediatrics

HBHC and Aris Health offer Pediatrics, treating infants, children, and youth. Our pediatrics team focuses on primary medical care, immunizations, routine wellness visits, sick child visits, and school physical exams.

HIV/STI Walk-In Testing Services

HBHC's Walk-In Clinic provides low-cost, confidential testing and treatment of sexually transmitted infections (STIs). The Walk-In Clinic will give you choices to personalize your health care needs. HIV testing, STI testing, syphilis testing and treatment, and Hepatitis vaccination services are available.

Testing Together

Testing Together is a new HIV testing and counseling service for male couples that allows partners to receive their rapid results together. This service provides a basis for an ongoing healthy conversation between partners about HIV in the relationship, and will allow partners to talk openly about building a protection plan together.

Trans* Health

HBHC is committed to improving the health of the transgender community and offers many comprehensive services for trans* and gender variant individuals, including informed consent hormone treatment (known as the THInC program), youth hormone treatment, counseling services, primary medical care, case management, and weekly support groups. All programs and services through HBHC are provided regardless of insurance coverage or ability to pay.

Youth Services (The Broadway Youth Center)

The Broadway Youth Center offers LGBTQ youth a safe place for self-expression and other services such as basic medical services, HIV and STI testing, and advocacy services that include referrals for housing/shelter, employment, vocation/education help, mental health, lost identification, and basic needs.



INTEGRATED HEALTH AND SUPPORT SERVICES

Behavioral Health Services

Behavioral Health Services at HBHC are easily accessible and, like all of our services, fully equipped to address the unique needs of the community we have served for nearly 40 years. Each client's concerns, history, prior treatments and current levels and causes of distress are taken into account every time we offer intensive individual therapy, crisis intervention, group therapy, couples counselling, and psychiatry. Our team of Behavioral Health professionals works to link clients with the most appropriate services, both by assigning a therapist at HBHC and in the community by offering referrals and alternate treatment suggestions outside of HBHC that may better meet the client's needs.

Violence Groups

HBHC's Violence Recovery Project (VRP) offers individual and group counseling, plus comprehensive services to survivors and victims of domestic or intimate partner violence. Participants can be open about their sexual orientation and gender identity, and begin to heal from emotional, financial, sexual, and physical abuse. Providers are trained in LGBTQ culturally competent treatment of all types of trauma.

Coping Groups

HBHC offers a gender-inclusive group for all members of the LGBTQ community who have experienced unfairness in their relationships. The group addresses issues related to planning for emotional, physical and financial safety, and ways to develop and maintain healthy relationships.

Aging As We Are

Aging As We Are is a social support group for LGBTQ elders that provides a safe meeting place, lunch, a moderator, and periodic programmatic sessions. Sessions vary from presentations on health insurance options, computer training and self-defense workshops, to local events and story sharing.



CASE MANAGEMENT

Linkage to Care

Howard Brown Health Center's Linkage to Care (LTC) staff work closely with HIV-positive individuals to identify barriers to care and navigate the health and social service systems over a short-term period. The initial steps of establishing or re-engaging in care can be difficult, and assistance may include accompaniment to appointments, benefit applications, behavioral health screening and referrals, and medication assistance.

Retention in Care

Once linked to care, people living with HIV/AIDS (PLWHA) experience both individual and structural barriers to remaining in care. HBHC's Retention in Care (RIC) specialists provide support to individuals who are at risk of being lost to care or have lost care. Our RIC specialists employ a number of methods to contact individuals lost to care, including phone calls, text messages, e-mails and letters. The RIC often not only prevents HIV-positive individuals from falling out of care, but also provides crucial emotional support, and direct linkage back into medical treatment.

Outreach

HBHC offers free HIV and STI testing services at various locations throughout the Chicago area including the clinic, bars and The Brown Elephant Resale Shop locations.



EDUCATION AND RESEARCH

HBHC engages in research studies that examine and address health disparities in the LGBTQ community using a variety of research methods. HBHC is currently participating in almost 20 clinical trials studying the safety and efficacy of various treatments for HIV/AIDS.

Bitch to Quit

Bitch to Quit (BTQ) is a smoking cessation study specifically for LGBTQ smokers and is the only one of its kind in Chicago. Based on knowledge and activities that have been proven effective with heterosexual smokers HBHC has created LGBTQ specific materials. The program includes group counseling sessions, nicotine replacement and peer support. The project's goals are to help participants stop smoking and test how well the program works for LGBTQ smokers in general.

HEALE

HBHC has developed ground-breaking curriculum for nurses that teach cultural competency in the care of older LGBTQ adults. The Health Education About LGBT Elders (HEALE) curriculum is funded through a Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) grant. Under this grant HBHC is able to bring this curriculum to a variety of health care and educational settings in Illinois, and present to nursing staff and students, as well as any other disciplines who would like to attend.



The Brown Elephant

The Brown Elephant Resale Shop started in 1982 and has three locations in Andersonville, Oak Park, and Boystown. The Boystown location is the original location and remains the "flagship" store.

We sell more than 740,000 items and welcome more than 220,000 shoppers each year. The Brown Elephant also operates a donation pick-up service that runs six days a week making stops throughout the greater Chicagoland area.

In addition to sales of donated items, The Brown Elephant generates additional revenue by selling items that are not appropriate to the assortment of the stores to a third party salvage company.

Thanks to our shoppers and donors, The Brown Elephant Resale Shops help to fund services for more than 50% of HBHC's under and uninsured patients.

Your old sofa can help save a life. You know where that money is going. It's going to help people, it's going to help my friends and my community.

Stefin Steberl left a career in corporate retail for one in design, only to return to retail. After volunteering at The Brown Elephant for six months, "I thought 'Wow, this is fun.' My skills fit here and it's a really good time," he says, "and now, three years later, here I am!"

As manager of the Oak Park location, his responsibilities include day-to-day management of the store, pricing merchandise, and coordinating social media. And donations can be surprising: in vogue mid-century furniture in mint condition, art that is auctioned for thousands through an auction house that partners with Howard Brown Health Center, and Stefin's favorite, a pair of art nouveau candlesticks tossed in the donation bin that later sold for \$1,200 each. "The Brown Elephant is different every day," says Steberl. "It changes every day, every hour." He also sees changes happening at

HBHC. "It surprises me every day when I hear about a new program," he says. "I think 'Wow, I didn't even know about that!'"

Steberl cites HBHC's outreach program as his favorite. "Sometimes going to the doctor for a test can be scary, but if you're in a bar or in a store ... Howard Brown Health Center does testing in our store four times a month, and here are these nice, friendly folks that are testing for free. Whether or not you have something that concerns you, it's done and over."

Naomi Goldberg and Libby Hemphill represent the changing face of Howard Brown Health Center. Both have employer-provided insurance, but when they moved to Chicago three years ago, they wanted their insurance dollars to support an organization that helps others. "I also liked the idea of going someplace that's LGBTQ friendly and I didn't have to explain anything," says Naomi.

They sheepishly admit to being somewhat surprised by HBHC's physical space and professionalism. "For some reason, I thought it was going to feel thrown together, like on a shoestring," Naomi laughs, "but the staff is top notch and the facilities are beautiful! It really is whole person care. That surprised me, and I think would surprise most people, too."

Adds Libby, "I think people would be surprised that it's an LGBTQ clinic, and they might not know when they left, either. It's just like any other doctors office, except for those of us who sometimes have challenges at a doctors appointment. Here we don't. "They have since referred straight friends seeking primary care services to HBHC.

When the two made the decision to start a family, they chose HBHC. "We go there for family health, so we decided to go there to have a baby, too," says Libby. An informational session held every other month proved very helpful, providing advice and information on choosing a donor and sperm bank, navigating insurance and finances, and providing referrals for legal, medical, mental health and birthing resources that are specifically tailored to the LGBTQ community.

Baby Nathan was the result. "It was a positive experience all around," says Naomi. "Our lives and our family are just very normal here. We walk in as a family and get treated as a family because we are a family."

Naomi: It's nice to walk in and not have anyone make assumptions about who you are or why you're there.

Libby: And if they do, they're closer to reality!

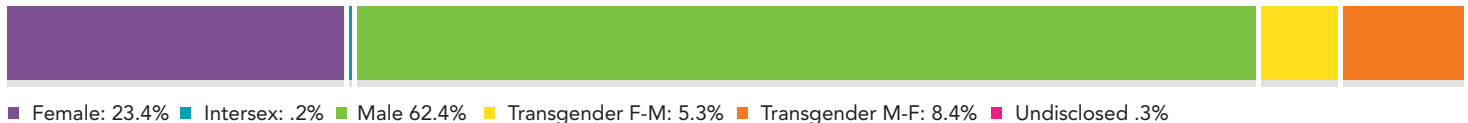

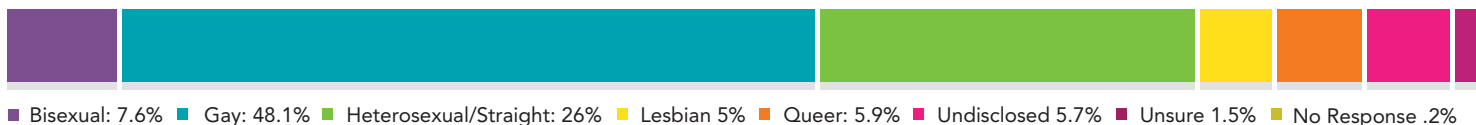

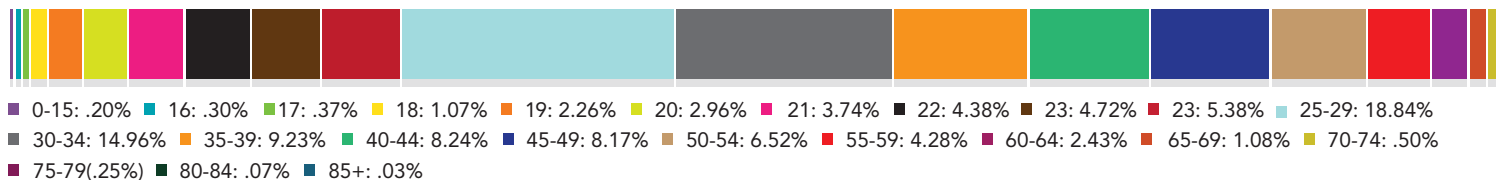
Patient Gender



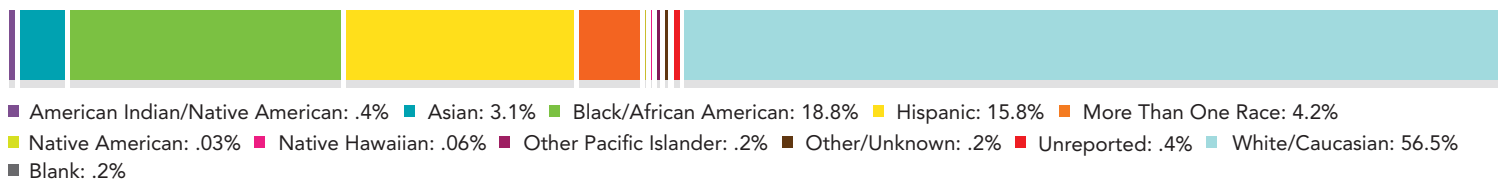
Patient Orientation

I realized that so many of these people would be lost in the complicated and overtaxed public health system if they didn't have HBHC. I can still envision walking through that waiting room and realizing 'This is really important.'

Romel Powell truly represents the impact that Howard Brown Health Center can have on a single life.

His childhood spent mostly in foster and group homes, Romel came to HBHC's Broadway Youth Center (BYC) and found a welcoming, understanding, supportive and safe space that helped him organize day-to-day basics such as transportation, food, clothing and laundry.

He aged out of the youth program, but HBHC continues to play a significant role in Romel's life. Case Management helps him with his HIV treatment, and his doctor and case manager "played a huge role in me getting sober," he says, and they continue to do so. "I didn't expect the level of individual commitment. My case manager and I have an amazing relationship. I'd been so closed off for so many years. I met him when I was 20 and he was one of the first people I opened up to. I'm 27 now, but he still plays a significant role in my life. He's more than just a case manager. He's my number one go-to."

As an Outreach and Prevention Specialist at Mt. Sinai Hospital and a student studying psychology at DePaul University, Romel was inspired by the help he received from HBHC. "It's the companionship, the individualized service plans, but it's more than that. It's the passion behind it. Everybody that works at HBHC has a passion for what they do. There is nothing like the BYC anywhere else in Chicago. And there's only one Howard Brown Health Center," he says. "I know the Broadway Youth Center and Howard Brown Health Center saved my life."

HBHC allows LGBTQ youth to be who they are, gives them guidance, a way to release their emotions and feel safe and vulnerable. And they're not turned away for it.
